What is a diary?

A diary entry can be a recount of something you have done, an imaginary scenario or a mix of both!

- Diaries are written in past tense, about something that has already happened (whether it's real or imaginary!)
- Diaries must use personal pronouns e.g. I / we etc
- Diaries are written in chronological order
- Diaries are written in chatty, informal (colloquial) language
- Diaries are descriptive and show feelings/emotion, thoughts and/or opinions




Dear Diary,

Whiteboard activity:

- Split into groups and choose an item from the classroom to write a short paragraph from the object's point of view.
