CLASS NEWS

EYFS

This week in EYFS, we will be finishing our topic 'Me and My Community'. We will remember all of the community helpers we have learnt about and will discuss what we would like to be when we grow up. In phonics, we will continue learning our set 1 sounds, including f, e, I, h and r. In maths, we will be learning about measure and using words to describe the size, or mass of an object. Finally, in RE we will begin our new topic about what makes us special.

Year 1

This week in maths we will be recapping adding numbers within 10. In English we will be exploring the features of letters, as well as writing in the first person. In RE we begin our new topic 'Families' and will discuss how families show love. We will learn about the 7 continents in geography, sketch portraits of each other in art and explain how the shapes of objects made from some materials can be changed in science.

Year 2

This week in Year 2 we will be learning about comparing numbers and objects in maths. We will be looking at the tens first and then the ones to see which number is bigger and which number is smaller. We will be using the > and < symbols to show our answers after making the numbers with tens and ones. In English this week we will begin to look at writing non-chronological reports about a dragon. We will be using a story map to help us learn a report before writing our own. In geography this week we will be learning about a key on a map and how to find a variety of different locations using the key. In our science learning this week we will be finding out about different reptiles and what they need to survive.

Year 3

In maths this week, we are finishing off our place value topic by comparing and ordering numbers to 1,000 and counting in 50s. In English, we are finishing writing our fantasy narrative and learning how to edit and improve our writing before moving on to exploring non-chronological reports. In RE, we begin our new topic of 'Homes' by answering the big question – What makes a house a home? We then explore with others, our idea of being a family at home. In geography, we use the eight points of a compass to locate a geographical feature or place on a map, and in science we carry out some comparative and fair tests to test the amount of fat in some foods.

Year 4

This week in English, we will be identifying features of an informal letter in preparation of writing our own about life in another country. In Maths we will be exploring roman numerals and rounding up to 10, 100 and 1000. We will be creating our own digestive system in Science and identifying

the countries in North and South America. In R.E we are learning about who Sean Devereux was and why his actions were important, how he was called by God and the impact he had on others.

Year 5

This week we will be starting a new unit of writing in English, focusing on Non-Chronological Reports. We will be researching facts about planets and using our skills to write our own reports. In maths we will be continuing our learning about addition and subtraction, however we will be focusing primarily on adding decimals with the context of money. During our Science lesson this week we will be exploring and investigating the effects of friction and in Geography we will be learning about vegetation belts and biomes. RE we see us start our next topic all about ourselves. We will begin the topic by exploring and discussing the actions of 'peacemakers', giving reasons for what they did, and answering our big question, 'Who am I?' During our PSHE learning we will be exploring what is meant by the term habit, and why habits can be hard to change and in Art we will be sketching landscapes.

Year 6

Year 6 this week will begin writing biographies on Charles Darwin and Sir David Attenborough. In Maths, we will be finding common multiples, prime/square/cube numbers leading onto multiplying digits using the formal column method. We will continue our topic on Evolution in Science, focusing on adaptations and investigations. Our RE topic on Loving and the Domestic Church- linking love and family to Christian beliefs and actions.

Parent Teacher Association (PTA)

St Mary's are looking for volunteers to set up and run the school's PTA. The main role of the PTA is to build strong working relationships among parents, teachers and schools, in support of students, at schools where the PTA raises a significant portion of the school's discretionary money. In recent years the PTA have worked really hard in raising money for our school by organising events such as Discos, musical evenings, Christmas & Summer Fair and a BBQ at Sports Day are just some of the events that have been held over the years which have helped to pay for new books for the library, compost and plants for Gardening Club, Pantomime at Blackfriars, breakfast for SAT's, Year 1 dressing up outfits, Autism items and Year 6 diaries and pens.
