## **Road Safety**

These zigzagged markings outside schools are to provide a clear, safe area where children can see traffic, and be seen by drivers. Drivers should never stop on them, even for picking up and dropping off children. Always park where it is safe and legal to do so and make sure your child gets out of the car on the kerb side rather than into the traffic.

A concerned parent reported that they had witnessed some children, stepping into the road. If your child walks to school alone, please speak to them about staying safe. All the children have been spoken to about road safety and being sensible when lining up for the school gate to open. We thank you for your support in continuing to keep our children safe. If your child comes into school on their bike or scooter, it is an expectation that they wear a helmet.

## **Introduction of Fixed Penalty Formal Warning from September 2023**

From September 2023 we have decided to take the decision to request that the Local Authority issue a Fixed Penalty Notice where unauthorised absence exceeds 15% in a six-week period.

If you wish to seek approval for any request of absence for your child(ren) from School, then you must apply in writing to the Head of School, at least four weeks in advance of the requested period. (Please request a form from the school office). You should only remove your child(ren) if the absence has been authorised, and notified to you in writing by the School. Any exceptional circumstances must be clearly set out in the written request to the Head Teacher who will consider each case upon its merits.

If you then choose to take your child out of school during term time and it is not deemed to be exceptional circumstances and/or has not been approved by the School, then this will be coded as an unauthorised absence and a Fixed Penalty Notice will be issued for the period of absence. The law states that, where there are unacceptable levels of attendance, schools may request that the Local Authority issue a Fixed Penalty Notice following the legal framework:

- Section 7 of the Education Act 1996 places upon parents a duty to ensure that their child receives efficient full-time education either by regular attendance at school or otherwise.
- Where a child is a registered pupil at a school and the parent fails to ensure that child's regular attendance at school the parent is liable to be prosecuted for a criminal offence under section 444 of the Education Act.
- In some cases, where this duty is not being fulfilled Section 444B of the same Act empowers the Local Authority to issue a Fixed Penalty of £60 per parent, per child, which will increase if the fine isn't paid within the first 21 days to £120
- Failure to pay a Fixed Penalty may result in further legal action being taken against you.

ALL fines are retained by the Local Authority and the school does not receive any of this. We will continue to work with families to support as much as we can with attendance and further information can be found in our school attendance policy on our website. Should you wish to discuss this matter further, please contact the school office to make an appointment.

## **CLASS NEWS**

## **EYFS**

This week in EYFS, we will begin our new topic 'Exploring Autumn'. In this topic, we will be learning about some signs of autumn, what Harvest Festival is and celebrating Harvest by creating our own artwork. In maths, we will be learning about patterns, spotting patterns around us and learning how to copy repeating patterns. Finally, in RE, we will continue our 'what makes us special' topic by learning that God knows us by name and loves each one of us.

#### Year 1

This week in maths we will be recapping subtraction within 10, practicing subtraction by crossing out and taking away. In English we will be practicing writing using persuasion. In RE we will be discussing ways that God looks after us. We will learn about the 5 oceans in geography, sketch portraits of ourselves in art and sort objects by their properties in science.

## Year 2

This week in Year 2 we are going to be writing our non-chronological reports on dragons and other fairy tale creatures. We will be using sub headings to split up our writing into sections and we will be using conjunctions such as because, that and when. In our maths learning this week we will be finding number bonds to 10, 20 and 100. We will be using tens frames to help us as well as hundred squares. In RE we will be learning about new beginnings and prayers as well as how we can thank God each day. In our geography learning we will be finding out about hot and cold places and what they are like.

## Year 3

This week, in maths, we start our addition and subtraction topic by exploring number bonds and patterns when adding and subtracting 1s, 10s and 100s. In English, we are learning about features of non-chronological reports and focusing on using capital letters when writing a description. During our RE lessons, we are thinking about ways in which parents and children love and respect one another and how this links to rules within our home and the rules we follow as Christians. In geography, we are learning about the properties of the Earth's four layers and in art, we are recreating a colour composition in an innovate challenge. As part of Black History Month, this week, we are learning about Nelson Mandela and creating a fact file all about him.

## Year 4

This week in English we will be finishing, editing and publishing our informal letters about spending the day in another country. In Maths we are continuing with rounding numbers to the nearest 10, 100 and 1000. In Science we are identifying the four types of teeth and their functions. In Geography we will be looking at the contrasting climates of North and South America, identifying their similarities and differences. We begin a new topic in R.E and will be exploring ours and others' family trees. We will also be looking at different ways we can stay safe in PSHE.

## Year 5

This week in English we will be planning and writing our own persuasive letters, trying to persuade the children of St Mary's to care for and look after their environment. In Maths we will be moving onto a new unit of learning, focusing on multiples, factors and prime numbers. During our RE learning we will be exploring and discussing the actions of 'peacemakers', giving reasons for what they did. We will also be making links between Genesis 1:26-31, the qualities that God has given us and how we as God's children, help to look after the world and the people in it. Within Science we will be investigating pulleys and during our Geography lesson we will be exploring a range of continents. Towards the end of the week we will be learning how to say classroom instructions in French and in art we will be sketching and painting landscapes.

## Year 6

In English this week, Year 6 will be completing their biographies on Sir David Attenborough. We will then move on to writing persuasive texts about the importance of 'Looking after our planet.' In Maths, we will be calculating division using short and long methods. R.E. will be based on God's unconditional love and questions we may have about life linked to Christian beliefs. We will be using scales on the map for Geography and analysing data in Science.

## Parent Teacher Association (PTA)

St Mary's are looking for volunteers to set up and run the school's PTA. The main role of the PTA is to build strong working relationships among parents, teachers and schools, in support of students, at schools where the PTA raises a significant portion of the school's discretionary money. In recent years the PTA have worked really hard in raising money for our school by organising events such as Discos, musical evenings, Christmas & Summer Fair and a BBQ at Sports Day are just some of the events that have been held over the years which have helped to pay for new books for the library, compost and plants for Gardening Club, Pantomime at Blackfriars, breakfast for SAT's, Year 1 dressing up outfits, Autism items and Year 6 diaries and pens.
